



With a record number of developments in the pipeline, our Development Department continues to find creative and innovative ways to stretch our subsidy dollars. But beyond all the visible deals they are bringing to the table each week, MaineHousing Development Director Mark Wiesendanger and his team

Homes We Need For Maine

have played a key role in the development of some cutting edge housing technology in collaboration with the University of Maine at Orono. An idea that was seeded in an email from Mark to Habib Dagher, the Executive Director of the UMaine's Advanced Structures and Composites Center, more than two years ago, is literally starting to take shape in the form of a 3-D printed house. Known as "additive

manufacturing", ASCC's team believes they will be able to fully print a two-bedroom home in less than 80 hours. The kicker being the resin the home is printed from is made from residual wood fiber and cornbased binder making a material that's not only environmentally sound but many times stronger than concrete. A small group of MaineHousing employees toured the lab in early July to see parts of the house being printed and to learn about the technology up close. The experience left all in awe of the potential this technology may have in helping create affordable housing more quickly in the future with homegrown materials and technology developed by the best and brightest from Maine. "This homegrown technology coming from our own University of Maine is something we can all be really proud of," MaineHousing Director Daniel Brennan said. "Not only does it put our state at the front of the pack in solving the housing crisis, it will also directly make housing more attainable and affordable for thousands of Maine families.' Meanwhile, Mark's role in the work also made him a sought out source by the state's media including Maine Public and the Maine Sunday Telegram. 




While mortgage interest rates have almost doubled since this time last year, MaineHousing's rate remains well below the market rate in Maine, which will help a projected 900 households find their way to homeownership this year alone. Additionally, in April, MaineHousing boosted its closing cost and down payment assistance for eligible buyers from \$3,500 to \$5,000. You can see all of our First Home production numbers here.

Units under construction: 974 Units in the MaineHousing pipeline: 3,671 All development data can be viewed on the development dashboard.




